Database Name:

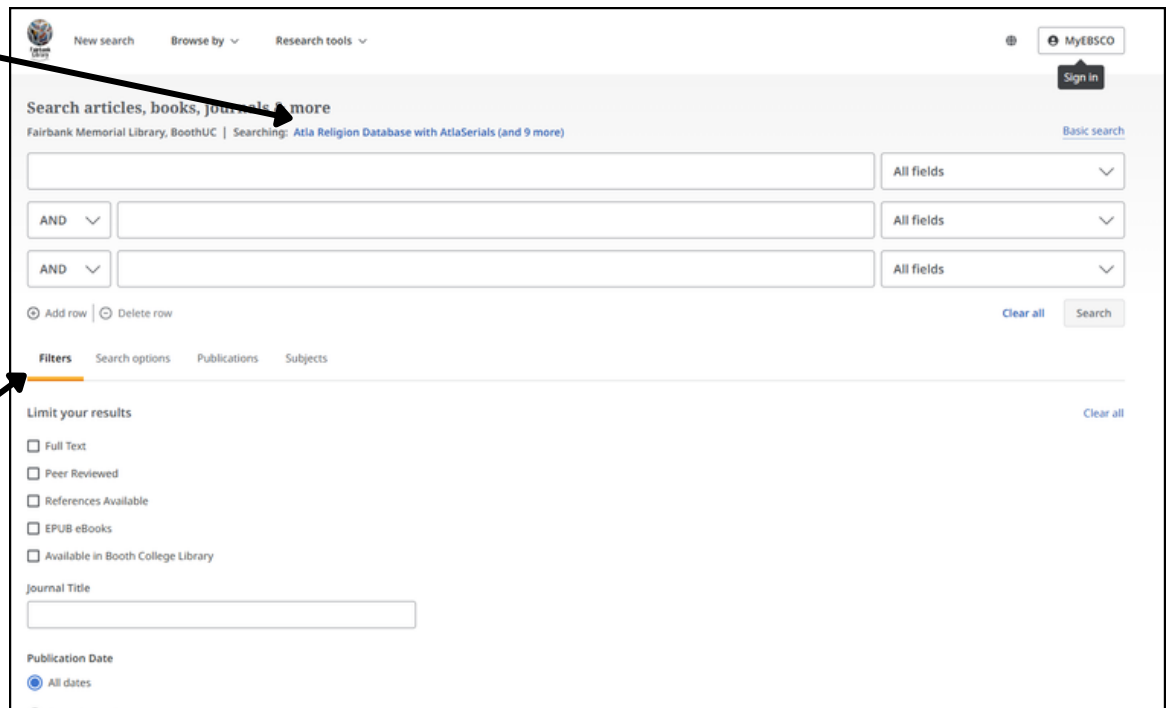
Click on Databases to search more than one at a time. This may increase the number of results you get.

Filter:

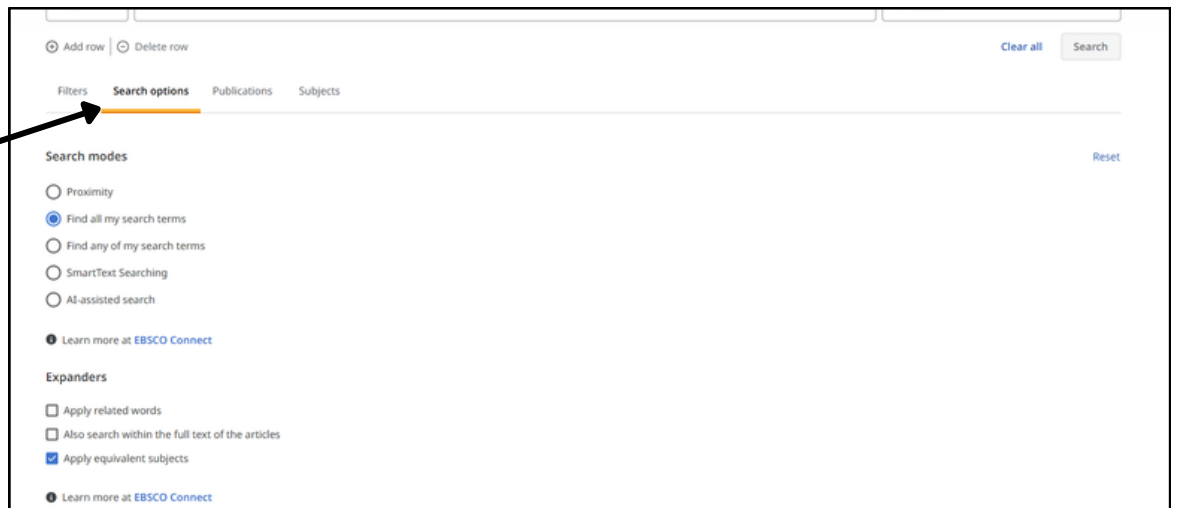
Click on the Filters tab to narrow your results to peer reviewed sources, date, or other limiters.

Search Options:

Choose Find all my search terms for keyword searching. Choose Proximity for more focused results.
